QAKDALE'S MOTHER

In early April, Don Riise welcomed Valerie Medina and Ernie and Mike Morua to the museum. They are descendants of the family of one of Oakdale's most admired women,

Tomasa Perez Griffith.

Mrs. Griffith was born in Big Oak Flat in 1881 to parents who had come from Mexico to work in the gold mines. She moved to Oakdale to work as a housekeeper and seamstress. In 1905 she

opened a restaurant which soon became a local favorite. The single mother of one son, she started taking in orphaned and abandoned children at a time when there were few social supports for those kids. Over her long lifetime, she raised more than 40 children. She also offered care and shelter to elderly homeless people, even presiding at their



funerals and providing plots in the cemetery. An admirer wrote to her, "you have a heart that beats for humanity and the unfortunate." It was a sentiment shared by so many that she was known fondly as "Oakdale's Mother."
